SESSION 1 (JUNE 21 — JULY 18)				
HIST 192 Japan Past & Present	Introduction to Japanese culture. Explores myth, tradition, modernity, and postmodernity with one eye trained on the future. Examples from personal experience.			
HIST 363 American Business History	American businesses from their colonial origins to the present. Interaction between the political, social, economic, and ideological environment and the internal structure and activities of business enterprises.			
HIST 396 Samurai in Film	In-person/remote, TR 4:00-7:50 PM. Examination of the image of Japan's warrior class, the most prominent social group in Japan for over seven centuries. Combines films, readings, and lectures.			
HIST 463 Sports in U.S. History	Varying topics on the economic development of the United States as a preindustrial, industrial, and postindustrial society. I: The Great Depression. II: Industrialization. Repeatable twice when topic changes for maximum of 12 credits.			
HIST 468 Pacific Northwest History	Regional history to the mid-20th century. How the Pacific Northwest mirrors the national experience and how the region has a distinctive history and culture.

HIST 190 East Asia Civilizations	Introduction to traditional China and Japan; Confucianism, Buddhism, Daoism; floating worlds; family and gender; traditional views of the body; literati class; samurai; Mongols and Manchus.

Repeatable twice when topic changes for maximum of 12 credits.

SESSION 3 (AUGUST 16 - SEPTEMBER 12)

HIST 202 19th C U.S. History	Creation and development of the United States and its social, economical, political, and cultural consequences. Jacksonian era, expansion, commercial and industrial revolution, slavery, Civil War, Reconstruction, Gilded Age, imperialism, and the Progressive Era.
HIST 273 Environmental History	Introduction to concepts, concerns, and methods of environmental history.

Explores aspects of the African American experience in the era of slavery and HIST 470 Reconstruction. Repeatable twice when the topic changes for a maximum of 12 **Slavery in U.S. History** credits.
